Angela is a poet from Ohio who was left homeless and continues on the verge of it with her children. All three women are based in Los Angeles and have transitioned out of Alexandria House, a non-profit organization that provides housing and other resources for women and children." (Velez, Jeniffer) "Can't nobody throw shade on your name in these streets. Triple threat, you a boss, you a bae, you a beast." (Bieber, Justin) Bringing you into these women's lives through their struggles gives you a

firm understanding of how much they have worked to get where they are, creating resources for others who may have been in situations that they have faced.

Logos is mainly about finding the logic in the subject at hand. The lyrics in this song by Justin Bieber and Quavo help connect others with things they may not have realized connected them.
